Augustus Emmet Maxwell, an eminent jurist and statesman of Florida, was born at ziberton, Ga., Sept. 21, 1820. He was a son of Simon and Elizabeth (Fortson) Maxwell, also natives of Gorgia, who removed to Alabama when he was two years old. He was educated in Alabama and in the University of Virginia; was admitted to the bar of Greene county, Ala., in 1843 and practiced law at Eutaw until 1845, when he removed to Tallahassee, Fla. In 1847 he was elected to the Florida legislature, and in 1849 to the state senate. He was also secretary of state and attorney-general of Florida; and in 1853 became a member of the United States congress, serving with distinction until 1857. On the secession of his state, and the orgaress, he was elected Confederate States senator. In which capacity he served from 1862 to 1865. In 1866 he was apolnted judge of the supreme court, but owing to the complications of the "reconstruction period he rejsigned his office. In 1877 he was appointed judge of the supreme court, but owing to the earst judicial clrcuit of Florida, an office he resigned in 1885, and in 1887 he was appointed 'inking on the bench until 1891. In 1885 he was a delegate to the constitutional convention of the state. For a half century Judge Maxwell was identified with the history of public affairs in Florida. He was married to Miss Sarah koane Brockenbrough, at the University of Virginia, in 1843. She died in 1846, Judge Maxwell mak three children by his first wire: Lacy B., who married D. Frank C. Wilson, of Alabama, and dismeon, a farmer in Mississipi. By his second wife he had five children. of whom three are living; Walker A., residing in Marianna, Fia.; Evelyn C., judge of the supreme court of Florida, and residing at Talhahassee; and John E., of Pensacola. Judge Maxwell was a member of Christ's Episconal church of Pensacola. __
