

Miss Occie Clubbs Dies Saturday

Miss Occie Clubbs, an eminent Escambia County historian, who retired from the Escambia County School system after serving some 48 years, died Saturday afternoon in a Pensacola hospital.

of the Agnes McReynolds School was past state historian of the American Association of University Women; past president of the County Principals Club; past secretary of the West Florida Educational Association and a member of the Caxton's Literary Club.

Miss Clubbs is the only known

person to have written a biography on Stephen R. Mallory, the secretary of the Navy of the Confederate States of America.

Miss Clubbs, who was a native and lifelong resident of Pensacola, attended the University of Virginia, the University of Chicago and was a graduate of the University of Florida.

Her extensive travels took her over the United States and to Alaska, Canada, Europe, Mexico and South America. She was a contributor to the Florida Historical Quarterly, Normal Instructor, Journal of the Florida Education Association and once served as society editor of The Pensacola Journal.

Miss Clubbs has received countless awards and is listed in the Who's Who in America.

She served as vice president of the Elementary Principals and FEA secretary, of the West Florida Education Association. Miss Clubbs was director of the YWCA, the USO, the American Red Cross, the Pensacola Library Association, and was first vice-president of the Pensacola Art Institute.

She was also a member of the Music Study Club, the Azalea Garden Club, the Delta Gamma Social Sorority, the Phi Kappa Phi and the Kappa Delta Pi sororities.

Survivors include a brother, Edwin Clubbs of Pensacola.
