

## CAPTAIN BAKER'S RITES SET TODAY

### Veteran Of Waterfront Dies After Injury Year Ago

Funeral services for Capt. William Henry Baker, Sr., widely known veteran of the Pensacola waterfront who died yesterday at the home of his daughter, Mrs. E. R. Swaine, 1310 Pettersen street, will be held from that address at 3:45 p.m. today. Additional services will be held at 4 p.m. in Christ church with the Rev. Henry Bell Hodgkins officiating.

Captain Baker, longtime master of vessels plying in and out of Pensacola, had been confined to his home more than a year since an accident in which he was badly burned as he attempted to light a pipe. His death, however, was due to pneumonia, doctors said. His last position was with the Aiken Towing company.

Burial will be in St. John's cemetery with the following acting as palbearers: William Sweeny, Charles Simpson, John Rauscher, Capt. Bennie Rocheblave, George Edgar, R. H. McCullough, Amos Runyan, and Chief A. Torrence.
